ANNUAL REPORT

Klinic is a non-profit, community-based health care centre in part of the core area of Winnipeg. We provide primary health care to our geographic community as well as provide specialized health services to the Province of Manitoba. Klinic promotes health and quality of life for all; helps people make choices about their own health in a context which is culturally sensitive and supportive of personal and community development; seeks to address the special needs of our neighbourhoods and helps communities organize on issues of concern; and looks to our community for direction.

What are the Services provided by Klinic?



- **Community Health & Education Services**
 - 24-hour sexual assault crisis line for Manitobans.
 - short-term in-person counselling for victims of sexual assault and their families, friends and supporters.
 - medical, legal support and advocacy for sexual assault victims.
 - training and education in areas such as crisis intervention, suicide prevention, sexual assault, family violence, reproductive health, prenatal care and well baby care.
 - youth health education services through Teen Talk.
 - community health education.
 - community development.
 - volunteer recruitment and screening.
- **Counselling Services**
 - 24-hour Manitoba Suicide Line provides confidential telephone support for Manitobans who are impacted by suicide. This includes services to individuals who are feeling suicidal, those who are concerned about family and friends who may be at risk of suicide, and those who have suffered personal bereavement from suicide.
 - 24-hour crisis line for Manitobans providing confidential telephone counselling, support and referral.
 - individual and group counselling for individuals affected by trauma, domestic abuse and suicide bereavement.
 - Manitoba Farm & Rural Stress Line which provides telephone support, counselling and information to anyone whose life is in any way affected by farming, agriculture and rural living; this service is provided out of our Brandon office and staffed by local residents.
 - individual and group counselling to women transitioning out of the sex trade and recovering from childhood sexual abuse and addictions.
 - no fee drop-in counselling to anyone for any reason, typically a one-time appointment but can provide short-term follow up counselling.
 - Workers Compensation Distress Line providing 24-hour confidential telephone counselling for those having trouble dealing with the effects of their injury.
- **Health Services**
 - Primary health care including prevention, health promotion and education provided by a multi-disciplinary team including doctors, nurse practitioners, primary health care nurses, medical assistants, dieticians, social workers and lab technologists.
 - Service areas include family practice, reproductive/sexual health care (including youth), child and maternal health, geriatrics, HIV, Hep C and TB.
 - Outreach services for the elderly and those with mobility and mental health issues provided by physicians, nurses, social workers and dieticians.

KLINIC PROGRAMS

Klinic Community Health Centre provided services throughout Manitoba during the 2008/09 fiscal year, our 38th year of operation. These services were provided by 204 employees providing a full time equivalent of 101.4 individuals and 253 volunteers providing 37,748 hours of service, a full time equivalent of 17.7 individuals.

Highlights of our service volumes include:

- health education services provided to 19,451 youth throughout the province by the Teen Talk program.
- crisis lines answered 45,188 calls (suicide, crisis, sexual assault, Manitoba Farm & Rural Stress lines).
- accepted 130 new clients for primary health care services, and opened 2,250 charts for the Agency

SERVICE HIGHLIGHTS

Immigrant/Refugee Primary Care

Manitoba has among the highest per-capita rates of immigration in Canada. Many of these individuals, particularly refugees, find the core area of Winnipeg as their first home in Canada. Newcomers to Canada, particularly those accepted as refugees, are potentially at higher risk of having health concerns than the general population.

Klinic's Refugee Health Program provides screening and treatment for reproductive health concerns, infectious diseases including tropical and parasitic infections, nutritional deficiencies, as well as assessment and treatment of client-identified health concerns. Basic vision and dental screening is done and clients are referred as needed. Immunizations are given according to Canadian immunization standards. Client assessments and subsequent investigations are done over a period of 3-4 months. Following this, we help clients and families find ongoing medical care elsewhere. This turnover of clients allows us to keep accepting new clients into the program. All test results and chart information is forwarded, with the client's permission, at no cost to the client. Some clients continue to receive their health services at Klinic if they meet our intake criteria and we have capacity. Klinic sees approximately 100 refugee clients per year, about 10% of the total number of refugees arriving in Winnipeg every year.

STI Clinic

Klinic has provided a nurse-based STI service since May 2008 which operates Monday to Thursday from 4:00pm-8:00pm and Saturday from 10:00am-5:00pm. Nurses are working under an approved Klinic procedure, which allows them, when competency is attained, to independently screen and treat STI's. During a 12 month period we have had 3,090 client visits, 8,000 labs and had to turn away over 200 people. We had 14 new lab confirmed clients with syphilis and 16 referred in confirmed cases. We treated all 30 cases. We have also diagnosed 4 new cases of HIV and referred or treated those clients. In our evaluation we found that 60% of clients had a "family doctor" but preferred to be seen at Klinic, 95% of respondents said that the hours were convenient and 91% were very satisfied or somewhat satisfied with the service received. Though a very small sample size must be noted, there were clients who indicated they used the information they received and 70% (N=7) stated they had changed their behavior since their first appointment at the STI Clinic.

Teen Talk North

Klinic received funding from MB Health & Healthy Living for the Teen Talk North Resource Development Project, a multi year initiative with the goal of addressing the health education needs of Northern Manitoban youth. We will be partnering with northern based service providers and community groups and employing a train-the-trainers model to increase the capacity of our partner organizations to address this need. It is anticipated that this type of service partnership based on collaboration and sharing of knowledge and resources would in fact strengthen all our organizations and enhance our ability to respond to the health needs of the youth we serve. In time we would have a network of service providers trained in the Teen Talk Program curriculum able to disseminate information on sexual, reproductive health, mental health, substance use and anti-violence education to youth living in northern communities.

Trauma Tool Kit

A public launch of Klinic's DVD on women exiting the sex trade, the "Trauma Tool Kit" (a new training series on suicide prevention), was held in November at Health Sciences Centre carried throughout the province via telehealth.

Mental Health Promotion

Klinic Counselling services piloted a new mental health promotion initiative which invited people attending at Drop-In to attend a two-hour interactive, educational session on mental health. This pilot was to assist people to better understand what makes for good mental health. Counselling Services has begun to integrate a mental health promotion perspective into its approach to service delivery.

Broadening our Lens of Violence in Intimate Violence Training

Klinic redesigned the training it offers for service providers on family violence intervention. This new two-day interactive and dynamic training invites service providers to explore and challenge their understanding of the complex issue of family violence and relationships. The training integrates a systemic approach to family violence that looks at family violence within the context of relationships and practicing family violence prevention from a multifaceted approach.

Trauma Training

With funding from the Department of Health and Healthy Living, Klinic developed a two-day training on trauma-informed counselling and a half-day workshop on trauma-informed care. Both the training and workshop are intended to increase understanding of trauma and the recovery process as well as increase the capacity of health and social service systems in Manitoba to better meet the needs of people whose lives have been affected by trauma. It is estimated that one in four Canadians have experienced a trauma sometime in their life and one in ten suffers from post traumatic stress. It is universally understood that a majority of people who access health and social services are at risk of being inadvertently retraumatized in every health and social service system. These trainings and workshops are intended to increase understanding and better equip service providers to support the healing and recovery process. These trainings will be offered across Manitoba at no cost.

Advanced Suicide Prevention Training (ASPT)

Few clients challenge us more than clients struggling with suicide. Suicidal clients are dealing with deep and profound pain that can cause the service provider to feel overwhelmed and inadequate. The responsibility is great, and we are expected to assess the situation accurately, and the pressure is on us to help the client stay safe and alive. Given the gravity of the situation, it is paramount that we possess best practice and current suicide assessment and intervention information and skills. ASPT explores these areas in-depth, going beyond the basics and towards more detailed assessment and intervention strategies to support clients on their road to healing. The training also covers the link between trauma and suicide and the importance of trauma-informed assessment. Relationship building and the impact of the work on providers is also a central focus.

Aurora Family Therapy Centre – Partnership Pilot

Klinic's Counselling Services has entered into an exciting partnership with the Aurora Family Therapy Centre. Klinic and Aurora are conducting a one-year pilot where Klinic is a training and practicum site for students completing their Masters in Marriage and Family Therapy.

Klinic Quality Team

This year a Klinic Quality Team began developing a quality improvement plan. This Team is chaired by the Program Evaluation and Research Analyst, and membership includes the five Program Directors and a representative from each the three areas of Klinic: Health Services, Community Health and Education and Counselling. Initial meetings of this Committee have focused on establishing Terms of Reference and defining the role of the Team in Klinic's ongoing and upcoming quality improvement initiatives.

INNOVATION

Transition, Education and Resources for Females (TERF) Initiative

Klinic is providing nursing services for New Directions in their program – TERF. This program is an education, prevention, transition and holistic healing initiative for children, women and transgender individuals who have been, or are at risk of being, sexually exploited. TERF assists to stabilize living situations, promote healthy lifestyles and build confidence and self-esteem. A nurse practitioner from Klinic provides the women with health services. This is a good connection, as some of these women are already Klinic clients in Dream Catchers.

Cooking Classes - Pilot

Cooking class have been delivered to a number of clients as a pilot supported by both a dietitian and a nurse. This nutrition and life skills instruction is being held in the basement kitchen at Klinic on Portage. The response to this has been very positive.

Client Yoga

Beginning in June, free drop in yoga classes have been available to Klinic clients once per week. This initiative was included in Counselling Services strategic directions.

Urban Farming

The partnership with The West Broadway Development Corporation, The Landless Farmers Collective and Klinic for gardens at Klinic on Broadway (KOB) has resulted in a second season of an urban farm at KOB. Food is being grown for Agape Table, Broadway Neighbourhood Centre, and the Good Food Club.

RECOGNITION

Klinic holds an annual agency recognition award event to acknowledge and celebrate with staff and volunteers. In conjunction with the Annual General Meeting in 2009, Klinic will recognize one person for 30 years of service, one for 20 years of service, three for 15 years of service, five for 10 years of service and sixteen for 5 years of service.

It is Klinic's staff and volunteers that make Klinic the successful community health centre it is.
