

2007 – 2008 ANNUAL REPORT

Klinic is a non-profit, community-based health care centre in part of the core area of Winnipeg. We provide primary health care to our geographic community as well as provide specialized health services to the Province of Manitoba. Klinic promotes health and quality of life for all; helps people make choices about their own health in a context which is culturally sensitive and supportive of personal and community development; seeks to address the special needs of our neighbourhoods and helps communities organize on issues of concern; and looks to our community for direction.

What are the Services provided by Klinic?



- <u>Community Health & Education Services</u>
 - 24-hour sexual assault crisis line for Manitobans.
 - short-term in-person counselling for victims of sexual assault and their families, friends and supporters.
 - medical, legal support and advocacy for sexual assault victims.
 - training and education in areas such as crisis intervention, suicide prevention, sexual assault, family violence, reproductive health, prenatal care and well baby care.
 - youth health education services through Teen Talk.
 - community health education.
 - community development.
 - volunteer recruitment and screening.
- <u>Counselling Services</u>
 - 24-hour Manitoba Suicide Line provides confidential telephone support for Manitobans who are impacted by suicide. This includes services to individuals who are feeling suicidal, those who are concerned about family and friends who may be at risk of suicide, and those who have suffered personal bereavement from suicide.
 - 24-hour crisis line for Manitobans providing confidential telephone counselling, support and referral.
 - individual and group counselling for individuals affected by trauma, domestic abuse and suicide bereavement.
 - Manitoba Farm & Rural Stress Line which provides telephone support, counselling and information to anyone whose life is in any way affected by farming, agriculture and rural living; this service is provided out of our Brandon office and staffed by local residents.
 - individual and group counselling to women transitioning out of the sex trade and recovering from childhood sexual abuse and addictions.
 - no fee drop-in counselling to anyone for any reason, typically a one-time appointment but can provide short-term follow up counselling.
 - Workers Compensation Distress Line providing 24-hour confidential telephone counselling for those having trouble dealing with the effects of their injury.
- Health Services
 - Primary health care including prevention, health promotion and education provided by a multidisciplinary team including doctors, nurse practitioners, primary health care nurses, medical assistants, dieticians, social workers and lab technologists.
 - Service areas include family practice, reproductive/sexual health care (including youth), child and maternal health, geriatrics, HIV, Hep C and TB.
 - Outreach services for the elderly and those with mobility and mental health issues provided by physicians, nurses, social workers and dieticians.

KLINIC PROGRAMS

Klinic Community Health Centre provided services throughout Manitoba during the 2007/08 fiscal year, our 37th year of operation. These services were provided by 204 employees providing a full time equivalent of 82.17 individuals and 270 volunteers providing 37,273 hours of service, a full time equivalent of 17.9 individuals.

Highlights of our service volumes include:

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- health education services provided to 29,193 youth throughout the province by the Teen Talk program.
- crisis lines answered 42,089 calls (suicide, crisis, sexual assault, Manitoba Farm & Rural Stress lines).
- accepted 63 new clients for primary health care services.

Partnerships

Partnerships provide many opportunities for Klinic to expand services and reach more members of the community. Many exciting partnerships were formed as well as expanded during the year.

Klinic partnered with the Winnipeg Regional Health Authority (WRHA) to manage the Critical Incident Reporting and Support Line (CIRSL). The CIRSL documents reports of incidents where patients, clients or personal care home residents were unintentionally harmed and submits those reports to the WRHA. A support component was added when Klinic assumed responsibility for this initiative. Emotional support is offered to staff, patients and family members who where involved with and affected by a critical incident.

Klinic became the first organization in the prairies to offer Auricular Acupuncture (ACU). An ACU clinic is offered every weekday morning. This important initiative is funded in part by the Department of Health and the WRHA. Other partners include the Health Sciences Centre, Addictions Foundation of Manitoba, Canadian Mental Health Association, the Harm Reduction Network and Mount Carmel Clinic. An evaluation of the ACU Clinic is being conducted and should be completed by the spring of 2009.

With funding from the Department of Health, Klinic launched the Manitoba Suicide Line (MSL). The MSL is dedicated to people who are having thoughts of suicide and people concerned about someone they believe might be at risk for suicide.

The Canadian Association for Suicide Prevention (CASP) selected Klinic to be the home of its national office and Klinic's Director of Counselling, Tim Wall, became CASP's new Executive Director. Klinic is now heavily involved in working closely with groups across the country to ensure that Canada adopts a national suicide prevention strategy.

The Manitoba Farm and Rural Stress Line (MFRSL) began a volunteer program out of Brandon. Volunteers are now being recruited and trained to take calls on both the Manitoba Suicide Line and the MFRSL.

Services offered at our satellite primary health clinics located at Tec Voc High School and the University of Winnipeg continued to be well utilized with an increasing client base. Services at the University have expanded to include campus health promotion activities in the areas of mental health, nutrition and reproductive health.

The Sexual Assault Crisis Program continues to partner with the North Eastman Regional Health Authority and Sexual Assault Recovery and Hope (SARA) in the development of their sexual assault response protocols. This initiative brings together local health care providers, the RCMP and community volunteers thereby allowing victims of sexual violence to receive services in their home communities.

Funding was received from Manitoba Community Services Council in support of the Healthy Living Program. This is a community-based program that provides education on chronic disease prevention (including diabetes), nutrition awareness and community building opportunities for residents in the St. Matthew's-Maryland area.

Funding was received from the Lount Family Foundation for the creation of a video resource and accompanying facilitator guide on teen dating violence. The video is being utilized as part of the Teen Talk Program's Dating Violence workshop. The video features the program's Peer Support youth volunteers.

Klinic continues to strengthen its partnership with the Western Alliance for International Physicians with our training of students, residents and foreign medical graduates.

Funding from The Winnipeg Foundation continues for the Man to Man project. This project provides education for employers and their work force on men and depression with a goal of increasing help-seeking behavior among men.

Klinic's partnership with the Gambling Help Line for Addictions Foundation of Manitoba expanded again this year.

Innovation

Klinic took a lead role in organizing a provincial forum on trauma. As a result of this effort, a provincial leadership committee on trauma was established to address the numerous recommendations that came out of the forum. Klinic was also actively involved in developing a "Trauma Tool Kit". The tool kit will be used by service organizations, health centres and others to deliver services that are trauma informed and sensitive.

With support from the Winnipeg Partnership Agreement, Klinic produced a DVD "Voices of Healing and Hope" a compilation of stories and pictures about woman exiting the sex trade.

Work on the development of a two-day Advanced Suicide Prevention Training began and will be completed in the fall of 2008.

The Crisis Lines continue on the process of going paperless and introducing electronic record keeping through iCarol.

Klinic's latent TB (Tuberculosis) program funding was increased allowing Health Services to increase latent TB screening and treatment. There is an increase in the number of occupational health screens in the latent TB program at Klinic.

Health Services has a fully functioning "Advance Access" model of client scheduling. This allows clients to get same day appointments and same week appointments depending on the severity of symptoms.

Recognition

Klinic participated in the United Way campaign and had a successful campaign.

Klinic holds an annual agency recognition award event to acknowledge and celebrate with staff and volunteers. In conjunction with the Annual General Meeting in 2008, Klinic will recognize one person for 35 years of service, 2 for 20 years of service, 3 for 15 years of service, 10 for 10 years of service and 15 for 5 years of service.

Our friend and colleague **Iris Brisbin** retired in June 2008. Iris began her Klinic career as a volunteer in December 1973 and became a permanent staff member in February 1984. Over the years, Iris touched the lives of hundreds of volunteers and staff as well as callers. She represents all that is the very best of Klinic . . . her:

commitment to quality care and service delivery, gentle mentoring of crisis workers, compassion towards clients and co-workers alike, inimitable sense of style, and generosity of spirit in general.
